the developing child sense and nonsense in education Vygotsky (1978), another well-known theorist in the areas of social development and education, argued that cognitive functions are connected to the external (or social) world. He viewed the child as an apprentice guided by adults and more competent peers into the social world.

### **Social Development: Why It Is Important and How To Impact It**

the developing child sense and nonsense in education Kohut's theory of self-psychology explored presentations of healthy and unhealthy forms of narcissism, which suggested the main function of narcissism was to allow people to suppress feelings of low self-esteem and develop a sense of self (Kohut, 1968).
